BARBOUR COUNTY AMERICAN LEGION MEMORIAL

The above is the picture of the American Legion Memorial which was unveiled here November the eleventh. It was erected by the Elkins Monumental Works in the west corner of the Court Square. The base is of Vermont marble which stands 8 feet high and the bronze "Doughboy" in full equipment above. This is a memorial the county should be proud of.

The inscription on the bronze tablet is as follows:

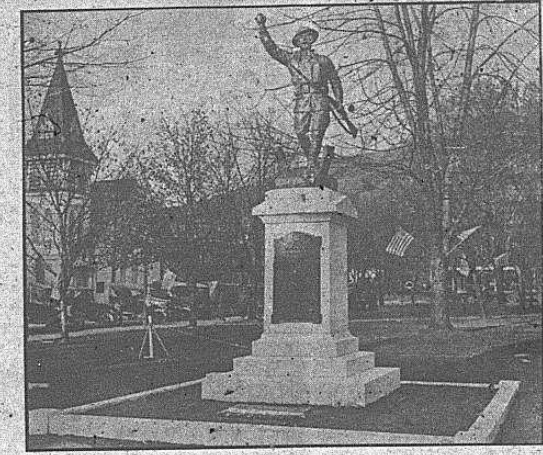

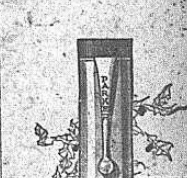
The Elk Farm Women's Club meets December 1st, one p. m. at Ebenezer. This is the beginning of the sewing lessons so all interested in sewing please come.

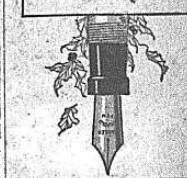
