The Barbour County Community Corrections Program was established in 2007. The program is a part of the Nineteenth Circuit Court region of Barbour and Taylor Counties. Originally the program was in a two-room office building on Mason Street, in Philippi WV. But since it's conception, the program has grown tremendously in both staff and client numbers. Therefore, creating the need for a larger office space. In 2011, the program moved to Court Street in Philippi which previously housed the 911 center.

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Purpose of the program

- Provide a viable alternative to incarceration for offenders at various stages of the criminal justice system, including bond, sentenced and pretrial diversion
- Provide sentencing alternatives to reduce prison/jail overcrowding while reducing recidivism and regional jail cost
- Promote accountability of offenders within their own community
- Address offender's criminogenic needs
- Provide intense supervision by utilizing appropriate graduated sanctions and incentives
- Provide evidence based program to meet individualized treatment needs
- Assist with local judicial criminal justice needs

Program Goals

- Widen the net of social control by expanding services from a correctional facility to the community
- Assure public safety, deterrence, and accountability while providing rehabilitative services to the offender
- Transition offenders from jail and/or prison to the community by establishing stable home plans and aftercare services
